## My Involvement in Our Community By Jeff Bixby

Many of you know of my involvement with LGBTQ+ organizations for many years. Though covid has curtailed many recent involvements, my work with GLSEN Northeast Ohio has remained active supporting local high school GSA's (gender and sexuality alliances) and the Kent State University LGBTQ+ Alumni Organization. I'd like to let you know of a couple of other efforts I have become involved with in the last few months. Representing GLSEN Northeast Ohio, I have recently joined the Ohio LGBTQ+ Youth Advocacy Coalition organized by the Columbus Kaleidoscope Youth Center and Equality Ohio. The groups' efforts are three-fold:

- 1. To set up constituent meetings with both Democratic and Republican legislators to educate them about the LGBTQ community generally and also the harms of recent anti-LGBTQ bills.
- 2. To coordinate and plan public education to raise awareness about harms of State bills and the importance of LGBTQ youth in our communities. This includes planning town halls, creating videos for social media, and other strategies.
- 3. To document stories from LGBTQ youth and those who support them.

We meet on Zoom once every two weeks. What is great about this is that activists from all over the state are discussing these efforts. This is one positive thing to come out of the pandemic.

Another project I am involved with is the LGBTQ+ Community Needs Assessment for the Greater Akron area, which is being funded by the Akron Community Foundation and several private donations. The effort is being coordinated by Kent State Research Program Coordinator, Andy Snyder. The past three month's efforts have been in preparation for the Community Needs Assessment. My work has been in one of seven leadership domains: Physical Health & Wellness, Religion Spirituality, Education & Literacy (my group), Housing, Food, and Nutrition, Employment & Commerce, Safety & Law Enforcement, and Recreation & Leisure.

Plans are that the survey will be ready for distribution in June and will continue to collect survey responses through Dec. 31<sup>st</sup>. Incentives for people to participate are in the works.
