


Akron Pride Parade and Festival




Halloween at Circle JJ and the Tree Planting

26th Annual Mr. Leather Akron Contest

This year marked the 26th annual Mr. Leather Akron contest, making it the oldest leather contest in Ohio. Although it is owned and produced by Ranger Gregg Lakota, the Rangers have been gracious to allow the contest to be a part of their annual Leatherfest, which is always held the Saturday before Thanksgiving. During the past year, Ranger Todd Zampa had held the title of Mr. Leather Akron 2018. He had done a terrific job representing Akron and the surrounding area which includes Canton, Warren, and Youngstown.

This year there was only one contestant running for the title. Although it may seem like a sole contestant would be a "shoe-in," it must be remembered that he must still score at least 70% in order to be awarded the title. In other words, the contestant is basically competing against himself. This year's contestant was Keith Greene, a resident from the Youngstown area.

Keith competed in four categories, each worth 100 points. The first category was private interview during which time he answered the judges' questions for 20 minutes. The second category was leather image in which he wore his best leather and was asked questions from his entry form by emcee Gregg Lakota. Afterwards, he gave a three-minute speech on the topic: "If you win the title, how can you make a difference in the leather community?" The final category was personality in which he wore his sexiest leather gear and was asked three questions of a creative nature, such as "Tell us about your BDSM experience with Donald Trump." This year's judges were Carleton Nash (Mr. Leather Akron 2017), Cody Feucht (Ohio Leatherboy 2018), and James Foster (Great Lakes Leather Sir 2019). The three judges used their experience and expertise judging each of the four categories.
